Mr LaBelle-

The perception that the ocean is a commodity and not a part of the human community, is a fatal flaw in the Mid-Atlantic ocean planning process. We collectively, have disregarded the symbiosis of any ecosystem management; the totality and complete synthesis of a living and breathing organism, the ocean, and the human role in its' historic demise.

Furthermore, the MARCO data set for marine life (mammals) is incomplete. The omission of specific species distribution, migratory patterns and existence, compromise the integrity of the data set. Any extrapolation or conclusions derived from this portal, becomes mired in the falsifications therein; without such known facts, any spatial marine planning becomes speculative at best, and unreliable at worst. In short, future objectives as directed by the National Ocean Policy of 2010, fails in numerous and problematic ways.


The ocean is a dissipated system of non-linear mathematics, a tropic cascading event of daily fluctuations in habitats of soft boundaries and seasonal fluctuations. To divide and categorize the divergent life without systemically adding significant measures of conservation and protection from additional anthropological stresses, defies logic. Furthermore, increased dis-functionality of ocean systems, including the elemental loss of sound or biophony (the health of ocean noise and species communication), compromises the most important directive of the National Ocean Policy.

6) Regional Ecosystem Protection and Restoration

The human interface with oceans over the last several centuries, has imperiled the future for all species of marine life. Our disposal of plastic pollution, over-harvesting of fisheries and the chemical infusion of man-made waste, has manipulated the natural balance of the oceans, and imperiled our own future. Human solutions to human problems inherently lack the objectivity necessary for success. The additional intentional bias of incomplete facts and scientific data, compromises the integrity of the project. A correct data set would include for instance, the predator/prey relationship of all species, and the necessary nurturing ecosystems requirements for propagation of marine populations for the planet's future.

The failure of the MARCO data portal is, in conclusion, to accurately and scientifically include the essential building blocks for a sustainable marine ecosystem, while imposing yet additional depletions of healthy markers of biological systems. A holistic approach of preservation is absolutely necessary. The public policies of resource extraction and ruination of more marine habitat, along with the manipulation of the ocean for human objectives, is one of existential poverty for our species.

As our ocean faces growing challenges of pollution, loss of habitat, and competing industrial uses, it's critical the Mid-Atlantic Regional Ocean Action Plan ensure a healthy ocean today and in the future. I applaud the RPB on its work to complete this first-ever draft Ocean Action Plan. I hope you will incorporate these recommendations below that will make this Plan stronger and more reflective of me, as an ocean user and coastal citizen.

The Final Ocean Action Plan must:

- Develop a robust and effective process for engaging stakeholders in Plan implementation. Right now the draft Plan's public involvement strategies are vague and variable. Stakeholders, project proponents and agencies will all benefit through a consistent, uniform engagement strategy.
- Set a short, definitive deadline - ideally by the end of this year - to identify and post on the Mid-Atlantic Ocean Data Portal areas offshore that are important for the health of marine life (ecologically rich areas or ERAs).
- Strengthen Federal agency commitments to the Plan's tools for coordinating agency decisions. It is unacceptable that even a few actions outlined in the draft Plan do not have a lead federal agency or tasks the entire RPB with overseeing implementation.

With these additions to the Plan, I know our region will take a big step forward toward a healthier Atlantic Ocean.

The Final Ocean Action Plan must:

- Develop a robust and effective process for engaging stakeholders in Plan implementation. Right now the draft Plan's public involvement strategies are vague and variable. Stakeholders, project proponents and agencies will all benefit through a consistent, uniform engagement strategy.
- Set a short, definitive deadline - ideally by the end of this year - to identify and post on the Mid-Atlantic Ocean Data Portal areas offshore that are important for the health of marine life (ecologically rich areas or ERAs).
- Strengthen Federal agency commitments to the Plan's tools for coordinating agency decisions. It is unacceptable that even a few actions outlined in the draft Plan do not have a lead federal agency or tasks the entire RPB with overseeing implementation.

With these additions to the Plan, I know our region will take a big step forward toward a healthier Atlantic Ocean.
